## **LESSON 5**1 Peter 2:11-17

But My people did not listen to My voice; and Israel did not yield to Me so I gave them over to the stubbornness of their heart to walk in their own devices. 	ar loving God and gracious Father still speaks to us through His Word. He wants us to ten and to yield so He can satisfy us. But we must <i>choose</i> to do so. Let's "open wide"!
Re	view your memory verses: 1 Peter 1:3-5, 2:1-3. (I did it!)
Re	ad 1 Peter through at one sitting. (I did it!)
<u>Re</u> 1.	Peter 2:11-17 thoughtfully five times. 1 2 3 4 5 Peter begins this section by referring to his readers as "beloved" (NASB) or "friends" (NIV). What does Peter convey to them (and to us) by the use of this term?
2.	Having read this section five times (you did, didn't you?) and reading on through chapter 3, you'll see that Peter is giving these folks some hard words. Couple this fact with his calling them beloved, and what application do you see for yourself when you have to relate to others?
3.	Peter, in verses 11 and 12 urges us to do two things. What are they?
4.	How will acknowledging ourselves to be aliens (expatriates) and strangers help us to do these two things?

5.	From verse 12, if you have good deeds and excellent behavior what is guaranteed to you? What is not?
6.	Think of an instance where you have been (or are being) the object of a false report intended to injure (slander).  a. What is generally your first response? Why?
	b. What <i>are</i> you to do? What understanding will help you do this?
7.	In chapters 2 and 3, Peter continues his instruction on excellent behavior by setting forth three specific areas where we must follow through. What area does he address in 1 Peter 2:13-17?
8.	What does 1 Peter 2:13-14 tell us we are to do? How does "for the Lord's sake" fit into this command?

9.	Now really! Does God expect us to obey this command today? Maybe Peter's government was <i>good</i> ! Is this command to submit to our government meant for me? (DIG DEEPER if you like: What was Nero's rule like?)
10.	Read 1 Peter 2:15-16. How does our being bondservants of God relate to our submission to our government? (Good thinking.)
11.	Read Acts 4:1-21. List the parallels you see between the Acts passage and 1 Peter 2:11-17.
12.	Read Matthew 17:24-27. Explain its relationship to 1 Peter 2:11-17.
13.	What does the fact that God taught Peter much through his everyday experiences as well as through crisis situations say to you?
14.	How does 1 Peter 2:17 relate to 2:13 and, therefore, to Peter's main idea in this passage?

15. In 2:17, Peter writes that we are to honor <i>all</i> people. Why? (See also Genesis 1:27.) What are some specific ways you can honor others this week?	
16. Why are we to "love the brotherhood of believers" (NIV) and what are some specific ways for you to do so this week? (Notice also that 1 Peter 1:22 says we are to "love from the heart" or un-hypocritically.)	
17. Why are we to fear or revere God? How can you demonstrate this in <i>your</i> life specifically?	
18. How can we fulfill the command to honor the king? (Think about the fact that all humans are made in the image of God.)	
19. Summarize the main principle that God has taught you from 1 Peter 2:11-17. (Pulling our thoughts together and getting them down in a summary, helps us see what we have really learned.)	
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
