Our study this week focuses on the messages to the churches at Sardis and Philadelphia.




Regional Powers

The following timeline provides a representation of the region's empires. Our investigation into Sardis and Philadelphia will touch historical points across centuries.



^{*} After 40 years of Greek rule, the area rebelled against Greece and became mostly autonomous (Kingdom of Pergamon) for about 150 years; Greece considered it a Greek city-state.

Sardis

From 1200 - 546 BC, the Lydian Kingdom held most of the territory that is western Turkey today. Lydia's capital, Sardis, was located on one of the several plateaus branching off of a mountain range that runs west to east. Sardis was built on a plateau on the northern side of the mountain range near the highest peak, Mount Tmolus, (7,076 feet.) The plateau has almost vertical sides, rising up from the plains by 1,500 feet and a single, winding road for access which made the city nearly impregnatable by invaders.

As the city grew in population and wealth, it expanded into the valley below on the western and northern sides of the plateau. The fortified citadel remained in the upper city, with watchtowers to safeguard the area. The population was complacent, feeling secure in their wealth and safety.

The rock sides of the plateau were smooth, but the rock itself was soft and crumbly – almost like hardened mud. Weather and time caused small cracks in the plateau sides to grow wide. In 547 BC, Cyrus the Great of Persia lay siege to Sardis. Unable to reach the citadel, Cyrus offered a reward to any of his men who could discover a way up to the top of the plateau. One of Cyrus' soldiers, Hyeroeades, observed a Sardian soldier drop his helmet off the edge of the wall at the top of the plateau and then climb down to retrieve it. Hyeroeades realized the plateau precipice was

scalable. Later that night he led a team of soldiers up a wide crack in the rock face. The Sardians were not even guarding this area and the Persians easily entered the citadel and Sardis fell.

Centuries later, history repeated – a soldier in Alexander the Great's army replicated Hyeroeades' feat and Sardis came under Greek rule.

By the time Sardis was part of the Roman empire, it was well known for wool trading and dyeing wool. There was a bustling textile and clothing trade in Sardis.

- 2. What do you learn about the Spirit in Isaiah 11:1, 2 that may help you understand the phrase, "He who has the seven spirits of God," in Revelation 3:1?

The number seven is used in the Bible to represent completion and perfection. Here is a meager sampling of the sevens in Scripture:

- Creation was finished in six days and on the seventh day, God rested.
- ❖ Joshua was instructed to march around Jericho once a day for six days and then seven times on the seventh day. Seven priests were to carry trumpets and the trumpets were to be sounded on the seventh day. (Joshua 6:1-4)
- ❖ In the Gospel of John, Jesus makes seven *I am the* statements. (*I AM* is also God's name which He revealed to Moses in Exodus 3:14.) (John 6:35, 8:12, 10:9, 10:11, 11:25, 14:6, and 15:5)
- ❖ In Revelation there are hundreds of instances of seven; here are just a few:
 - There are letters to seven churches, Jesus walks among seven lampstands and has seven stars in His right hand. (Revelation 1:4, 12, 16)
 - The scroll held by God on the throne has seven seals.
 (Revelation 5:1)

- The Lamb before the throne has seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. (Revelation 5:6)
- o Seven angels have seven trumpets. (Revelation 8:2)
- O Seven peals of thunder reveal a message from a small scroll that John is instructed to keep secret. (Revelation 10:1-4)
- Seven angels are given seven bowls of God's wrath to pour.
 (Revelation 15:7)
- o The book contains seven blessings. (Revelation 1:3, 14:13, 16:15, 19:9, 20:6, 22:7, and 22:14)
- 3. How is Sardis' history reflected in Jesus' words in verses 3:1-2, "I know your deeds, that you have a name that you are alive, but you are dead. Wake up and strengthen the things that remain, which were about to die; for I have not found your deeds completed in the sight of My God."? (Think about Sardis' reputation and how it may have influenced the church's self-perception.)

4. How is the warning in Revelation 3:3 especially relevant to a believer in Sardis?

- 5. Read Revelation 3:4, 5 one more time.
 - a. What does the clothing represent? (The cross references that follow may help.)

b. Zechariah 3:1-5 (One of the visions Zechariah had related to the rebuilding of Jerusalem and the temple after the Babylonian exile.)

c. Isaiah 61:10

6. What is significant about having one's name written in the book of life? (Revelation 20:11-15, regarding judgment before the great white throne, and Revelation 21:22-27 about the new Jerusalem will help.)

Philadelphia

When Alexander the Great died, Asia Minor came under Alexander's general Seleucus I Nicator's control. After 40 years, Philetaerus, who had served under the Seleucid governor Lysimachus, rebelled and the region operated mostly autonomously for 150 years as the Kingdom of Pergamon. Attalus II was king at the time of the founding of Philadelphia. Attalus II Philadelphos (*Philadelphos* being Greek for *one who loves his* brother) had succeeded his brother Eumenes II and it is thought that Attalus II named Philadelphia in honor of his deceased brother whom he dearly loved.

Philadelphia was established (as a doorway, in essence) with the intent of spreading Greek culture eastward and the effort was successful.

The soil around Philadelphia was favorable for growing grapes and Philadelphia became well known for its wines.

Western Turkey is close to several active tectonic plates. An earthquake in 17 AD destroyed Philadelphia, and other cities. Roman Emperor Tiberius Caesar provided Philadelphia funding to rebuild. In gratitude, its name was changed to Neocaesarea. A few decades later Emperor Vespasian (who was part of the Flavian dynasty) sought to change Philadelphia's name to Flavia to shore up the city's loyalty to his rule. Neither name change stuck and the city remained Philadelphia until the 5th or 6th century AD under the Byzantine Empire, then its name was changed to Alaşehir, the name the city bears today.

There are no visible ruins of Philadelphia today. The oldest ruins in Alaşehir are from the Byzantine period, 330 -1453 AD.

Read Revelation 3:7-13.

- 8. Consider the descriptors of Jesus in verse 7. What is meant by each? a. *He who is holy,*
 - b. who is true.

c. who has the key of David, (The angel Gabriel's words to Mary in Luke 1:30-33 may help.)

d. who opens and no one can shut, and who shuts and no one opens (There is similar verbiage about this and the key of David in Isaiah 22:20-23 in which Isaiah prophecies about the removal of Shebna, a

corrupt official, from King Hezekiah's court. Shebna would be replaced by Eliakim, God's servant.)

9. What might Jesus mean by the *open door* for the church in Philadelphia in Revelation 3:9? (There are multiple views about what this could mean, so there isn't necessarily one right answer!)

10. Reflect on Revelation 3:9. What is Jesus saying here? (A similar group of people are mentioned in the letter to the church in Smyrna in Revelation 2:9.)

11. In Revelation 2:10, the words *kept from* could also be translated as *kept through*. Look closely at what the church at Philadelphia will be kept *from* (or *through*). Which translation seems more applicable?

Explain. (Another hint is contained in the phrase, to test those who dwell on the earth. Those who dwell on the earth are mentioned at least 12 times in Revelation 13, where they are contrasted with those whose names are in the book of life of the Lamb. Those who dwell on the earth are unbelievers – the lost who worship the Antichrist.)

12. What does Jesus mean in His instruction and caution in Revelation 2:11?

13. Put yourself in the sandals of the church body in Philadelphia. From what you have discovered about natural and political disruptions they faced, how are the promises to the overcomer a tremendous encouragement?

APPLICATION – Lord, help me to live it!

14. The church in Sardis was spiritually dead. They seem to have been demonstrating the same inattentive and negligent behavior that had allowed the city to be captured multiple times. What is your personal takeaway (application) from the message to Sardis?

15. Look once more at the message to the church in Philadelphia, thinking about the power that Jesus has and the *little power* the church had. What do you find especially encouraging about Jesus' message to this body of believers? Is there similar encouragement for a situation you are facing?
