

STUDY GUIDE 3

Ephesians 1:15-23

In our last lesson, we began to learn about the great blessings we have from our glorious God: how He chose us before time began, to make us His own and destine us for wholeness and glory with Him. We also saw that all of this is ours through the work of Christ the Son. As C.H. Spurgeon put it, "He hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in Christ. If they came to us any other way we might lose them; or we might not be sure that they were genuine; but when they come to us in Christ, they come to stay and we know that they are real. If Christ is mine, all blessings in heavenly places are mine...we have never earned one...and they are the rarest, richest, most enduring – priceless."

It is also in the nature of God's blessings that they lead to even more blessings. The more we mine the treasures of their meaning, the more glorious ramifications we see for those who are His and the more clearly we see the greatness of our God. The verses in this next section of Ephesians 1 help us dig deeper into what it means to be "blessed with every spiritual blessing" in Christ Jesus.

Review your memory verse - Ephesians 1:3 - by writing it out here.

Read Ephesians 1:15-23 two times. (____ ____)

Read verses 15-17 again.

1. In verse 15, Paul says, "For this reason...", he is praying for them. To what do you think he is referring, from back in verses 1-14?

2. What 2 things has Paul heard about these folks? (verse 15)

Why are these linked together - why is increasing love for all other Christians a by-product of being a believer in Jesus? (1 John 4:10-11, 19 and 5:1 may help.)

3. Biblical love isn't necessarily an emotion, but rather concerns first attitudes, then actions. With the 1 John passages in mind, (and remembering it's God who leads us and changes us) do you see some specific new steps you'd like to take in showing love for other believers? (Perhaps somebody who's hard to love comes to mind...)

4. Right away, Paul gives us an example of one of the very best ways to really love somebody - by praying for them. Before we look at what Paul prays, what do you see in how he prays that you can apply in your own prayer life? (From Ephesians 1:15-16, also verse 17a in NIV.)

5. Paul knew many of the struggles and needs of these folks - he could have asked God for so many things! But in verse 17, what does Paul ask for them first of all?

Notes on verse 17: The word "know" here (or "knowledge") doesn't mean to just collect information, but to really know and view as reality, to intimately understand and personally experience.

Also, notice that different translations may say either "a spirit" (the actual original phrase) or "the Spirit", an attempt to clarify the meaning of the original phrase. The Tyndale Commentary states that probably here "the spiritual powers of wisdom and vision" is meant, but we should understand that this is only possible as "the gift of the Spirit, who makes wise and who alone reveals the truth".

6. In other places in Scripture, Christians are taught to bring every need and circumstance to God in prayer. Why do you think that in this passage, the Spirit of God leads Paul to pray first and foremost that his fellow believers will know God? (What do you think the Lord wants you to understand?)

7. Skim Psalm 103 (or Psalm 27) where King David tells what he has learned of his God. Are you getting to know God? What has He taught you about Himself?

Has knowing these things about God made a difference in your life? Explain.

What are some of the ways He used to reveal Himself to you? (Any hard times, long struggles, failures, etc.?)

8. How does remembering this affect:

-your perspective on the present struggles and hard situations in your life?

-your perspective on the struggles of others? (You may have somebody specific in mind.)

-the way that you pray for yourself and others?

Read verses 18-23. Note: As it's used here, "hope" doesn't mean desiring something that may or may not come about. It means the confident expectation of a sure thing!

9. According to Paul in verse 18, what believers could also really use is an understanding of the "hope His call holds for us" and "what rich glories He has promised the saints will inherit". (Jerusalem Bible)

Read the following passages that only begin to tell about our hope

and inheritance. Jot down the ideas (realities!) that you find particularly helpful.

- a. The hope of His calling
Romans 8:28-29

John 15:16

Philippians 4:19

Philippians 3:20-21

(Isaiah 25:6-9 to dig deeper!)

b. The riches of His inheritance [among] the saints:
Romans 8:16-18

(2 Corinthians 4:16-17 to dig deeper!)

1 Peter 1:3-7

Revelation 22:5

Note: Another way to look at "the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints" is to see it as the saints themselves being the inheritance God receives and finds glorious. Whether or not this is being taught here, it is a truth taught in Scripture (see Titus 2:14). This interpretation again underlines the great worth and value God places on His children.

10. Finally in Ephesians 1:19, Paul wants believers to know what?

11. With all that is going on in our lives and in the world, we can feel so powerless! What is significant to you that God led Paul to describe His power in these three ways from verses 19-20:

-it's of "surpassing greatness" ("incomparably great" NIV)

-it's "for us who believe"

-it's "in accordance with the working of His might which He brought about when he raised Him from the dead, and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly places"

(Want to dig deeper? Explain how verses 21-23 further "showcase" God's power that is available to us.)

12. In what specific situations do you need to count upon this incomparably great power of God?
13. In summary... Without knowing what He is really like, and without understanding the reality of His hope, inheritance and power for us, what can happen in our hearts (our thoughts and feelings) and our lives?

Thoughts in the Margins – Study Guide 3

- I. Paul's desire for the saints to know God deeply comes through so clearly in his epistle to the Ephesians. James 4:8a states, "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you." Some ponderings:
- a. Is a believer only as close to God as he/she seeks to be?
 - b. What, if anything, hinders you from drawing closer to God?
 - c. How would you advise someone about deepening his/her relationship with Jesus?
- II. Consider Ephesians 1:19 one more time:

¹⁸ *I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened, so that you will know what is the hope of His calling, what are the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints, ¹⁹ and what is the surpassing greatness of His **power** toward us who believe. These are in accordance with the **working** of the **strength** of His **might** ²⁰ which He brought about in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly *places*,*

Paul is so determined for his readers to grasp the magnitude of God's *power* that he uses four synonyms for the word:

<p>power (<i>dumas</i>, G1411)</p>	<p>Inherent, miraculous ability.</p> <p>This is the root word for the English word, <i>dynamo</i>. It may have been Alfred Nobel's inspiration for naming his invention dynamite in 1867, but <i>dumas</i> was not used to describe an explosive power.</p> <p>This is the word that Jesus used in Mark 5:30, in describing that power had gone out from Him when the woman with the hemorrhage of blood touched His robe and was healed.</p>
<p>working (<i>energeia</i>, G1753)</p>	<p>Active power.</p> <p>This is the word used of the power that raised Christ from the dead.</p>
<p>strength (<i>kratos</i>, G2904)</p>	<p>Power exercised. Force, might or power that can overcome resistance.</p>
<p>might (<i>ischus</i>, G2479)</p>	<p>Ability, strength afforded by inherent power.</p>

have been distressed by various trials, ⁷ so that the proof of your faith, *being* more precious than gold which is perishable, even though tested by fire, may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ;

4. Now locate the five instances of the phrase, *according to* (or *in accordance with*.)

The Greek word that is translated as *according to* (or *in accordance with*) is *kata*, G2596. Paul uses this word fifteen times in Ephesians. *Kata* is related to size, amount, or degree. It can be helpful to think of it as *in proportion to*.

In September 2025, a U.S. executive was briefly worth \$393 billion as his company's stock shares surged in price. If this man gave you \$100,000 from his fortune that would be exciting. But if this man gave you something in proportion to his fortune, say just 1%, you would receive \$3.9 billion!

5. When you read in Ephesians 1:5 that God *predestined us to adoption as sons through Jesus Christ to Himself according to* [in proportion to] *the kind intention of His will*, what does this reveal about the extent of *the kind intention of His will*?

6. Similarly, when you read in Ephesians 1:7 that, *In Him, we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to [in proportion to] the riches of His grace...*, how much grace does God possess? (What quantity is in proportion to that?)

Thoughts in the Margins – Study Guide 4

- I. You may have noticed that nearly all of the verb tenses pertaining to the spiritual blessings in Chapter 1 are past tense in English. In Koine Greek, many of those verbs are aorist tense and indicative mood, indicating a simple action which occurred in the past. (Aorist tense in any other mood communicates nothing about timing and duration of the action.)

In verse 3, when Paul writes that he and his readers are blessed *with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ*, that is a positional truth (the way God sees us,) but it may not be our current experience or condition (conditional truth.) This is a

concept for consideration as we compare the truths of Ephesians to an Old Testament endeavor.

- II. The story of Joshua leading the Israelites into their inheritance in the Promised Land is a physical representation of a believer's journey into their spiritual inheritance in Christ. As we make our way through Ephesians, we will add to the following table highlighting parallels between the two books.

Parallels Joshua & Ephesians

Joshua	Ephesians
Physical Inheritance = the Promised Land	Spiritual Inheritance = full, eternal life in Christ
General for the heirs: Joshua	General for the heirs: Jesus (Greek form of Joshua)
In Joshua 1:3, God tells Joshua, "Every place on which the sole of your foot steps I have given it to you,...." The inheritance is theirs solely as a gift from God before they ever step foot in the Land. (A positional truth that does not yet match their conditional truth.)	From Ephesians 1:3, believers are <i>blessed with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ....</i> These blessings are a gift from God, by grace. Furthermore, Ephesian 1:11 says believers <i>have obtained an inheritance....</i> (A positional truth that does not yet match a believer's conditional truth.)
The certitude of the victory and receiving the Land was a positional truth – the Land was theirs, but they had to make it their reality – experience it as a conditional truth.	Believer's certitude of victory & Christ as our inheritance is a positional truth, but we need to understand it as a conditional (our condition here & now) truth.
